On 2nd February the Year 10 GCSE English class travelled to London via train and tube to see King Ramesses at the British Museum. They had studied the poem Ozymandias which is about Ramesses and were keen to see the statue of him in the British Museum.

Here is their trip report...

'The journey was exciting, some of the students had never been on a train before and several had never been on the tube. They were responsible for their own train tickets and had to scan themselves through the barriers and show their tickets to the inspector. They had to keep their tickets all day and do the same on the return journey, they were all very responsible and no one lost their tickets.

When we arrived at the British Museum we went straight to the Egyptian statues and found King Ramesses. We looked at all the hieroglyphs and tried to work out what they said. Some of the class are also doing GCSE Classics and they were able to identify some of the Roman and Greek architecture pointing out Doric, Ionic and Corinthian columns.

We continued round the Egyptian Mummies and were surprised to see all sorts of mummies including cats, crocodiles, ibis birds and even a baboon! We walked through the whole museum and saw art and antiquities form many different cultures including Totem poles from Canada and the local treasures of Suffolk's Sutton Hoo.

When we had seen everything in the Museum we walked back to the station, stopping for Bubble Tea on the way and got the tube to the Tower of London to see the famous castle.

After that it was time to head back to Liverpool Street Station and get a quick meal before getting on the train home.'
